Pre-travel formalities for Users / COAS / VISCs

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1. Ensure you have been correctly pre-registered: An authorised person* must submit a pre-registration remotely for you via EDH (PREG). A copy of your passport/ID and a Home Institution Declaration (HID) must be attached to the PRT, duly completed and signed by an authorised representative of the candidate's home institution). * For USERS: Team Leader or Deputy Team Leader; for COAS and VISC: Department Head or other appointed person.	
2. Activate your CERN computing account: Request the activation of a CERN computing account from the CERN Service Desk and take the mandatory Computer Security course within 5 days to validate the account.	
3. Take the mandatory courses:	
Safety Always: be mindful of the risks you can encounter on the CERN sites and all aspects of Safety at CERN. We are all responsible for ensuring our own Safety and that of others, so please follow the <u>mandatory Safety e-learning courses</u> before you arrive. You will find the key safety aspects you should be aware of in <u>this flyer</u> .	
4. Obtain the necessary documents. Check the visa requirements applicable to you: Visa requirements and procedure for France and Switzerland.	
N.B.: third country nationals (including US citizens) not subject to short-stay C visa requirements as tourists must obtain a short-stay C visa for Switzerland when staying at CERN for more than 8 days and engaging in gainful occupation (including when the employer is based outside of Switzerland). Please refer to the Swiss authorities' overview of visa provisions according to nationality, paying particular attention to the "V1" specification. N.B.: holders of a residence permit issued by one of the Schengen states are entitled to stay for a maximum of 90 days in (an)other Schengen state(s) in any 180 day-period. Exception for those taking up employment and residence in Switzerland (Guidelines amended on 1st September 2022): Third Country nationals, holders of a valid residence permit issued by a Schengen State, are now exempt from the visa requirement to take up employment and in the context of family reunification. The same rule applies to those who hold a valid D visa issued by a Schengen State. Documents for non-EU/ non-Schengen nationals (see also: Stay in the Host States). Documents for EU/Schengen nationals (see also: Stay in the Host States).	
5. Organize your health Insurance and social security: <u>Health Insurance</u> is the responsibility of your home institution. You will have to make sure that you have accident and health insurance (also covering you for occupational illnesses and accidents) with adequate cover in Switzerland and France for you and	
any accompanying family members. It must include sufficient cover for all countries you may visit on official travel. Social Security	
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6. Organize your relocation: Accommodation; Importation formalities (vehicles, furniture, etc.); Driving authorisation. 7. Find out about: Cost of living and adequate financial resources To inform your choice of place of residence, carefully look into the cost of living in France and Switzerland as prices vary significantly from one country to the other. Pay particular attention to the adequate financial resources for Switzerland. N.B.: a D visa for Switzerland only entitles you to take up residence in Switzerland, not France. Life in the Local Area (childcare, education, taxes, etc.)	
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
